THE RAILWAY THROUGH KNIGHTDALE

In 1900 there was not a place called Knightdale. When the local landowners learned that the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad Company - organized as Raleigh & Eastern North Carolina Railroad in 1903, renamed in same year was laying a track from Norfolk, Virginia, to Raleigh, N.C., they were anxious to have a station in the area. The railroad was the fastest means of transportation at that time and a local station would be a big help to the farmers. Early in 1904 Henry H. Knight and wife Bettie (Smith) and Needham P. Jones and wife E. Meto deeded right of way property to the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad Company for the sum of one dollar. Tracks were laid in August of 1904. east from Raleigh, NC to Zebulon, NC Norfolk and Southern Railroad Company bought out the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad Company in 1905. Norfolk and Southern built a depot and a section foreman house in 1905, also two small (two room) houses for the section workers. These houses were built right beside the railroad tracks and shared a common well. The railroad station was named "KNIGHTDALE" and the town was begun. Stores, businesses, homes, and churches were soon built, with the depot as the center.

The establishment of a railroad station brought new people and jobs to the area. The depot agent and section foreman had very specalized jobs. The section foreman and his workers were responsible for ten miles of track.

For many years they rode "hand-cars" up and down the tracks. They had to examine the tracks each day and repair any damage to the rails and cross -ties, keep rails in proper position, put ballest (gravel) between the rails and cross - ties so weeds would not grow, and keep weeds and bushes from growing on the right of way to prevent fires from sparks from the engines. All this was done with hand tools.

The first section foreman in Knightdale was Erastus Cain, who served from 1905 until 1914. He was followed by Solomon A. Harrell in 1915, who served until his death in 1934. Arthur King became section foreman in 1935 and served until his retirement in 1968. At that time, the railroad company no longer felt it necessary to provide a home for the section foreman and they leased the house to Mr. King.

Mr. King still lives in Knightdale and the section house is leased to his daughter, Mrs. Ava Lee

Straughn. One of the section workers' house burned many years ago and the other one was purchased by the Town of Knightdale, moved to Robertson Street, and used for storage. Edna Harrell (Kropp) was born in the section foreman house in 1920. Bobby Harrell (grandson of Solomon Harrell) was born in one of the workers' house in 1932. Both Bobby and Edna are still residents of Knightdale.

The depot agents had many responsibilities. The depot had two waiting rooms (one for whites and one for blacks), an office with ticket window, and a warehouse. The agent had to build fires in "pot-bellied" stoves in the waiting rooms in the winter. The office did not have any heat. The agent had to keep records of all trains coming through, even those that did not stop at Knightdale. The agent sold tickets for those riding the passenger trains, check all mail and freight coming in and going out, and notify merchants and farmers of the arrival of their freight. Some merchants built warehouses on the railroad right of way. The warehouse built by Mr. Wiley Robertson (19) is still standing. The Postmaster had to meet the trains with the mailbags. Sometimes the train did not completely stop because there was not any freight to unload and the incoming mailbag was tossed out of the moving train and the outgoing mailbag was "hooked" from a pole.

The depot agents serving Knightdale were: Mr. Montgomery from 1905 until 1925; Mr. White from 1925 until 1930; Harvey Harriss from 1930 until 1932, Ray Richardson from 1932 until 1934; Bill James from 1934 until 1939, Ava Lee King (Straughn) from 1939 until 1940; Thelma Robertson from 1940 until 1945, with Gladys Robertson Harrell helping part time; and Mr. Pittman from 1945 until passenger service was discontinued in 1948.

There was a local railcar that ran from Wilson to Raleigh each morning and evening. It carried only passengers and mail. Some Knightdale residents rode the railcar to jobs in Raleigh and many rode it to shop in Raleigh .. The women dressed up, with hats and gloves, to go shopping in Raleigh.

Knightdale was known from Charlotte to Norfolk as Knightdale Hill. There is a steep incline from Raleigh to the east of Knightdale. Very often the freight trains had to disconnect part of the cars before they got to Knightdale and park them on the sidetrack, then go back to get the rest of the load. That meant a lot of shifting and whistle blowing in Knightdale. There is no

longer a side-track in Knightdale. There are five crossings in Knightdale as the track runs through the center of town. There was a signal light and gates installed at the Smithfield Road crossing in 1986. *The Neuse River bridge was rebuilt in 1968*

When Southern Railroad Company bought out Norfolk Southern Railroad Company in January 1, 1974, all freight service to Knightdale was stopped. The depot was no longer needed. George Pleasants leased the building and used it as an antique shop.


